The *Old Davie School 100th Anniversary Celebration* will reunite the community that learned, played, skinned knees, and grew together in a special building in a town like no other. On May 10, 1918, the town gathered together to dedicate the new Davie School with speeches from officials and residents and songs by students. On May 10, 2017, a cocktail hour in the historic auditorium upstairs will kick off the countdown to the 100th Anniversary. Over the next year, we will continue to celebrate and highlight the experiences of alumni—teachers and students—through the decades. CONSTRUCTION NEARING COMPLETION ON AGRICULTURAL AND CITRUS PACKING HOUSE AT OLD DAVIE SCHOOL

New Interactive Educational Exhibit Allows Students and Museumgoers to Step Back in Time to the Pioneer Days

Construction is nearing completion on the Agricultural and Citrus Packing House Exhibit at the Old Davie School Historical Museum. The new exhibit will become a part of the Step-Back-in-Time interactive educational program that demonstrates the life of Davie pioneers to the thousands of students and museumgoers that frequent the historical campus each year.

The Agricultural and Citrus Packing House Exhibit places Davie in the context of a growing Florida citrus industry by using equipment donated by Math Iglor Grove, a citrus grove and packing house business that has operated in Davie since the 1950s.

“This new exhibit will provide an opportunity for both residents and tourists to understand how oranges are grown, harvested and marketed, and to understand the tremendous influence the industry had on Davie and Florida’s history,” said Leslie Schroeder, Executive Director of the Museum.

The equipment was donated after the Old Davie School Historical Museum Board of Trustees became aware that the business was being dismantled to make way for the development of homes and a park. The equipment consists of scrubber sections, which cleaned the fruit; the sorting section, where workers pulled the fruit that was too small for shipping; the wax and dryer, to polish the fruit; and, the bin area to prepare the fruit for shipping.

The exhibit will include the citrus packing equipment, antique farm equipment and other early 20th century artifacts. The building will visually replicate an original citrus packing house and will prominently display the citrus packing house equipment to allow visitors to experience the packing process.

Citrus crates and signage will be placed around the packing equipment to replicate the interior of a citrus packing house as it was in the 1940s. Photographs, ledger books noting production schedules, collection bags, clothing and other items associated with Davie’s citrus farms, along with agricultural equipment from the early 1900s to the 1950s, including a tractor, hay rake, oxen plow and other unique implements used to farm in the Everglades will be arranged in a manner to help a visitor think they are stepping back into a moment in time.

The design, fabrication and installation of the exhibit will be completed with the help of museum staff, as well as donated time by local grove owners, architects, engineers, contractors, graphic designers, writers and photographers.

THE BARBIE EXHIBIT

The first National Barbie Doll Collector's Convention was held in New York in 1980 and in July this year, Old Davie School joined in the annual celebration of the most famous fashion doll in the world with an exhibition that told "The Barbie Story." The exhibits filled three of the classrooms and began with an Homage to the Zebra Swimsuit and guided visitors through the decades as Barbie evolved to her role today as a 21st Century Fashionista. The dolls, all from a private collection, included examples of vintage and reproduction dolls, as well as modern dolls, fashions and accessories. Mattel's marketing was a key component to the doll's success when she first appeared in 1959 and continues today, keeping to the philosophy of her creator, Ruth Handler: "My whole philosophy of Barbie was that through the doll, the little girl could be anything she wanted to be. Barbie always represented the fact that a woman has choices."

HOWARD & MAYME GRIFFIN

A Story by "their favorite"

Davie lost two of its pioneers recently. Howard Anderson Griffin, Sr., 89, passed away on November 6. His wife of 68 years, Mayme Lou (Pee Wee) Holman Griffin, passed away on August 11 at the age of 88.

Howard was born in Davie on October 15, 1927, and attended Davie School. In 1937, his parents were killed by a drunk driver on Griffin Road in Dania. His eldest sister, Anna Elida, and her husband Ralph Hammer raised the boys to keep them together.

Howard graduated Fort Lauderdale High and married Mayme, his high school sweetheart, in 1948. They celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary in June and were together 74 years. Mayme was also a proud native Floridian, born in Fort Lauderdale on January 19, 1928. Mayme and Howard raised four children, Andy, Fred, John and Becky. They lost their son Fred, then 37 years old, in 1990.

Howard was a partner in the family business, Griffin Brothers Co., Inc., a sod and landscaping company. He, Mayme, and their children spent 12 years in Clewiston running a sod farm for Griffin Bros. before Howard and Mayme returned to Davie in 1975. They spent the rest of their lives here, enjoying their eight grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Two of their children and two of their eight grandkids reside in Davie.

Howard was the last surviving sibling of the eight in the Griffin family. He was preceded in death by his sisters Anna and Christina; and brothers A.D., Harry John, Carl, Richard and Gerald. Mayme was also the last surviving sibling of her Holman family; preceded in death by her sisters Claudia, Milly, Marie, Frankie and Sara; and brother Raymond.

Both Howard and Mayme were loving, generous people who were extremely proud of their family. For decades, Mayme was an active volunteer in the community and for Florida Farm Bureau. One thing she was known for was her many collections, including her dollhouses. Howard and Mayme were early contributors to the ODS restoration efforts. In June, Mayme happily hosted her mother's family's 85th Carson Family Reunion in the ODS cafeteria.

Local grove owner and resident, Charles Walsh, accepted the Davie School building on behalf of the town at the dedication on May 10, 1918. He said, "We accept and thank you for this splendid building, a building no matter how large and important this community may grow, will ever be the center of its social

action and the main cause of any progress we may make. The citizens of Davie will take pride in it, maintain it, and cherish it." His home now resides on the Old Davie School campus.

Trivia Answer for Fall 2016:

Q: In what year did the state begin the dredging project that dug the North and South New River Canals?

A: The state-funded drainage project began in 1906 when the dipper dredges, Everglades and Okeechobee, started digging the North and South New River Canals. But it was a slow process—by the end of 1908, the dredges had barely dug seven miles west from Ft. Lauderdale.
